13:10 - 13:25	Keynote Wander Jager Tipping points of human behaviour Increasingly, transitions towards sustainability require the action of local communities to change practices, e.g. in generating and consuming energy, or promoting biking. Simulation models are increasingly being used by social scientists interested in the social dynamics that take place in larger groups of people over longer time periods. HUMAT has been developed as an integrative framework that is connecting different behavioral theories in a formal model. HUMAT also supports the collection of various types of data to parameterize cases. What is a social enterprise? How can you make a difference as a social enterprise? During this session we will take a closer look on what it means to be a social enterprise.

During this panel, dr. Emma Folmer will briefly explain the difference between corporate social responsibility and social entrepreneurship. She will also provide several (inter)national examples of successful social entrepreneurs. Based on her research, she will give tips and tricks for our (future) social entrepreneurs. She will explain why social enterprises work together more frequently than 'conventional' enterprises and what aspects have to be taken into account when you want to measure or increase your impact on society.

Vanhulley is an interesting case study of a social enterprise. Jolijn Creutzberg, the owner of Vanhulley, is one of the founders of impactful entrepreneurship in our region. Vanhulley makes unique clothing from used fabrics and provides work for women who do not have access to regular employment yet. At Vanhulley these women gain experience, receive training and are introduced to the labour market.

Wander Jager	Dr. Wander Jager is a social scientist interested in social complex phenomena. He is an Associate Professor at the University of Groningen and the Managing director of the Groningen Center for Social Complexity Studies. A key theme in Wander Jager's research is studying the dynamics of human behaviour in environmental contexts. Much of his work uses social simulation as a tool to explore human-environment interactions, e.g. related to issues such as innovation diffusion, land-use, littering and migration.
Hoang Nguyen	Within Industry Relations, Hoang Nguyen focuses on developments within the northern ecosystem in the field of Green Industry and Circular Economy. In this role, he establishes connections between researchers, companies, and organizations involved in innovations in that field. He is also active as Investment Manager at RUG Ventures, the investment vehicle of the University. His background in external relations and carrying out investment processes forms a solid foundation for creating new contacts and collaborations within the theme of Green Industry.
Klaus Hubacek	Prof. dr. Klaus Hubacek is a Professor in Science, Technology and Society at the University of Groningen. He is chair of Integrated Research on Energy, Environment and Society (IREES) and chair of the board of Energy and Sustainability Research Institute Groningen (ESRIG). Klaus is currently also a visiting professor in geographical sciences at the University of Maryland, College Park. His research focus is on conceptualizing and modeling the interactions between human and environmental systems. Klaus has published over 200 research articles in peer-reviewed journals on topics such as climate change adaptation and mitigation, participatory modeling, management of ecosystems services, land use change and governance, and is recognized as a highly cited researcher with multiple papers in the top 1% by citations.
Nicole de Koning	Nicole de Koning works as a senior consultant at TNO, within the department Energy Transition Studies. She focuses on social innovation and citizen engagement/participation in the energy transition, and how these relate to governance, technology and business development. Nicole currently works on several EU H2020 projects (e.g., POCITYF and BRIGHT) and national subsidized projects with this research focus.

Ceciel Nieuwenhout	Dr. Ceciel Nieuwenhout is currently a postdoc researcher in Energy Law at the Groningen Centre of Energy Law and Sustainability. In her current research, she focuses on the legal aspects of the energy transition in the built environment, focused on 'positive energy districts' and monumental buildings. Next to her work at the University, Ceciel is a city council member for the greens (GroenLinks) in the city council of Groningen. She is also a member of the editorial board of 'De Helling' Journal of the Scientific Bureau of GroenLinks. Finally, she is also a founding member of local sustainability initiative 'De Groene Bruggenbouwers' in her village.
Kees van Veen	Dr. Kees van Veen is Academic Director Sustainable Society. Within Sustainable Society, RUG colleagues work together on major societal challenges which require an interdisciplinary approach. One of the key challenges is the growing collision between planetary boundaries and present day food production systems which has large consequences for a wide set of stakeholders, regionally as well as (inter)nationally. Together with the colleagues of the research group Sustainable Landscapes and a growing set of external partners, he pushes this agenda in order to increase the societal contribution of the RUG to this major challenge that affects present and future generations.
Jan Willem Bolderdijk	Dr. Jan Willem Bolderdijk is Associate Professor at the University of Groningen. His expertise lies in the field of Consumer Behavior, Decision making, Social Marketing and Sustainability. His research aims to uncover individual consumers' psychological barriers preventing change.
Frank Hindriks	Prof. dr. Frank Hindriks is Professor in Ethics, Social and Political Philosophy at the Faculty of Philosophy of the University of Groningen. He is the director of the Center for Philosophy, Politics and Economics and one of the founding editors of the Journal of Social Ontology. His research interests include collective responsibility and sustainable institutions in an open society.
Susanne Täuber	Dr. Susanne Täuber is Rosalind Franklin Fellow and Associate Professor at the Faculty of Economics and Business at the UG. She examines social identity processes during organizational and societal change, particularly when such processes involve changes to moral norms and values. She further investigates the dynamics that affect the translation of policy into actual organizational change, for instance in the context of gender quotas. She is a member of the National advisory committee on diversity in higher education and research.
Esther Neven	Esther Neven is an external PhD student (scholar-practitioner) at the University of Groningen in the Faculty of Behavioural and Social Sciences. A scholar-practitioner combines insights from working in organizations with academic research. Her research focuses on social inclusion in organizations, and esp. within the Dutch Police Organization. She also works as an independent consultant, trainer and coach (www.neven.pro).
Julian Rengers	Julian Rengers is a final-year PhD student at the Faculty of Behavioral and Social Sciences at the University of Groningen. His expertise lies in workplace inclusion of employees with a concealable stigmatized minority identity, with a focus on lesbian, gay, and bisexual (LGB) people.

Jolijn Creutzberg	Jolijn Creutzberg is owner of Vanhulley, a social and circular organization that creates new products from clothing that would otherwise have been thrown away. Vanhulley employs women and opens the door for them by providing them with work experience and education.
Emma Folmer	Dr. Emma Folmer is Assistant Professor in sustainable entrepreneurship. With her research she aims to understand under what conditions social entrepreneurship can thrive, how social entrepreneurs deal with organizational challenges and how they create social impact on a community level. Emma is also the programme director of the MSc Sustainable Entrepreneurship at Campus Fryslân.
Aard Groen	Prof. dr. Aard Groen is Dean Entrepreneurship of the University of Groningen. He leads the University of Groningen Centre for Entrepreneurship (UGCE) and is full professor of entrepreneurship & valorization. His expertise lies in research, teaching and support of development of new innovative business in existing and new firms in international and/or in technological context. He is co-founder of the early stage accelerator Venturelab North and advisor to several enterprises and is member of advisory committees on entrepreneurship & innovation.
Geert Jan Arends	Geert Jan Arends is senior consultant Research Funding at the University of Groningen. After studying Solid State Chemistry at the University of Groningen, he worked in industry for 8 years (at a multinational corporation and at a regional small company). He came back to the University and now has more than 25 years of experience with European and National funding programmes. He helped set up the Carbohydrate Competence Center, a public private cooperation with 10 universities and 25 companies.
