



# Alumna experience Karin van der Velde (NL)

"I followed a placement in the Health and AIDS Department of the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs. That is where I became familiar with CHOICE for Youth and Sexuality, an organization where I worked as a volunteer for years. In those days, I had the privilege of travelling a lot, to UN meetings in New York and Geneva, and of teaching international training courses to young people.

Currently, I work as programme officer and youth participation advisor at Rutgers, a knowledge centre committed to the sexual and reproductive health and rights of young people around the globe. I have regular contact with four partner organizations in Uganda, two in Malawi and with the Rutgers country office in Indonesia. "






## After Graduation

Of the alumni of the Faculty of Religion, Culture and Society, 80% find a job within half a year, and 95% within a year (96% of them have a job on at least bachelor's level)
